I.G.R.A. BOARD MEETING

The first board meeting for the 1988-89 rodeo season was called to order at 8 p.m. by President Gerald Ford at the Austin Sheraton Crest hotel. All states were represented except for Oregon and Wyoming.

Reading of the minutes was waived due to the absence of the Recording Secretary. The Treasurer's report was tabled due to being incomplete.

Four committees reported to the board: Judges, Membership, Secretaries, and Finals Rodeo. The Judges report would later be discussed in the Trustee's meeting.

In regards to the Membership Committee, Utah was recognized as an association by phone and will be seated at the annual convention. Louisiana and Idaho are working on their papers. States in the distant future include South Carolina, Illinois, and Iowa.

At the final 1988 quarterly board meeting in Reno, the following items of importance to contestants were discussed by the Secretaries Committee.

In regards to duplicate state abbreviations, the computer program cannot handle a GSGRA for California and another GSGRA for Utah. The decision was made to use the postal standard two-letter Code plus the letters "GRA" in distinguishing one association from another and still stav within the 5-letter limitathat have already been tions programmed throughout the sys-The member associations tem. will appear as follows for computer purposes only.

> Arizona - AZGRA California - CAGRA Colorado - COGRA Kansas - KSGRA

Missouri - MOGRA Newada - NVGRA New Mexico - NMGRA Oklahoma - OKGRA Oregon - ORGRA Texas - TXGRA Utah - UTGRA Wyoming - WYGRA

The committee recommended and was approved to proceed with tracking bad addresses per contestant. After a rodeo that is complete. hosting association will forward to Denver all contestant addresses which have been returned due to bad addresses. After rodeos (approximately three six months), the contestant is not deleted from the database but rather is flagged and is not permitted a mailing label until a "good" address is submitted to the Rodeo Auditor at P.O. Box 2258 Denver 80201.

The Rodeo Secretaries also presented the final 1988 rodeo year results.

The Finals Rodeo Committee distributed copies of the official press release. Also. firms in New York and in law Washington have been added to the case as well as the one in San Francisco. They request we submit names to that the Silver State association for the questionnaire.

Bids were then accepted for the 1989 finals. California proposed to accept Arizona's proposal; the only submitted. In order to follow the bylaws, the board reinstated Nevada's bid for the rodeo finals. Nevada will in turn delegate the finals rodeo to Arizona on behalf of SSGRA and delegate all authority to AGRA. More on this issue in the following article.

First Hand Publications of Teaneck, New Jersey, is in the process of creating a magazine called First Hand Events to be issued quarterly. One edition wi11 be donated to leather, one to rodeo. and so forth. For New Business, the editors presented to the board a rather rough informal proposal for supplementing the finals rodeo in Phoenix.

First Hand Events will ...

- o donate \$2,500 to be split for all-around cowboy and cowgirl.
- o donate all-around cowboy and cowgirl belt buckles.
- o carry a full page B/W ad.
 - o display their "First Hand Events" banner at finals.
 - o be the official magazine of IGRA.
 - o provide ad space in First Hand publications at a 50% discount.

- to pay IGRA \$1 per paid ticket within 30 days of the rodeo. VIP's, rodeo volunteers, contestants, entertainers, and dance groups will not be charged admission.
 - to pay contestants a onetime payoff at completion of the rodeo:







INTERNATIONAL RODEO FINALS UPDATE (or the rodeo that wasn't)

The individuals who made the trip to Reno for the 1988 Finals Rodeo and intend to take part in the planned class action suit against Churchill County for losses incurred must wait a little longer. The intitial questionnaire that was prepared was deemed inadequate by two of the three law firms involved in the suit on our behalf. A more detailed questionnaire is being prepared and tenative plans have it arriving in Colorado approximately December 10th. We will have 30 days to respond with the suit being filed in late January.

At present the attorneys are also still preparing additional briefs in their effort to have the Nevada Supreme Court which issued the restraining order that closed down the rodeo. To this date, court records of the hearing in Fallon still have not been turned over to the Supreme Court. The attorneys are also preparing briefs for the Churchill County District Attorney's new suit to obtain a permanent injunction to block "EVER" a "GAY" Rodeo from taking place in his county.

HORSE SCENTS

STABLE VICES AND OTHER BAD HABITS

Horses in confinement often develop habits that may be annoying to their owners and even harmful to themselves. Most stable vices result from sheer boredom.

"Bolting" is a horse's habit of eating its concentrate feed very rapidly and without chewing it properly.

"Cribbing" refers to a condition in which the horse bites the manger or another object while sucking in air. It sometimes causes a "bloated" condition, and the horse is more likely to develop colic. This condition may be remedied by buckling a strap snugly around a horse's neck in such a way that it compresses the larynx when the neck is flexed or extended. If properly placed, such a strap will cause no discomfort at other times.

"Halter Pulling" refers to the habit of pulling back on the halter rope or bridle reins when tied. The halter or/or strap may be broken. allowing the horse to run awav.

Some horse develop a habit of "kicking" or "striking" the stall or other objects with their rear feet. They apparently do this for the satisfaction derived from striking something.

"Tail Rubbing" is a habit of persistently rubbing the tail against the side of a stall or on another object. This may result from parasites.

"Weaving" is a condition in which a horse weaves, or sways from side to side, while standing in a stall.

Draft horses may develop the habit of "balking" when hitched to heavy loads. Thus refuse to push they their shoulder against the collar. Such a habit sometimes develops because of a poorly fitting collar, which causes a sore on their necks or shoulders.

A horse may develop the habit of "rearing" on its hind legs when as attempt is made to lead it. Others may rear when mounted. Some horses develop the habit of "striking out" with the forefeet when they are being led and/or when they rear up on their hind legs. Other horses develop a habit of "shving" when ridden and may even unseat their Draft horses sometimes rider.

develop the dangerous habit of "running away" when hitched to wagon or other moving a vehicle. Riding horses, especially cow ponies, may"cold jaw", a habit of taking the bit in their teeth and running top speed. Pulling on the at reins or other methods commonly used in stopping them are often unsuccessful. Once these runaway habits develop, little can be done to correct them.

Another undesirable habit horses develop is that of playing "hard to catch" when their owners try to drive them into a stable or catch and bridle them in a pasture or pen. Other horses object to being harnessed or saddled. Gentle horses may develop the habit of expanding their chest cavity (breathing deeply, com-"swelling up") monly called when the saddle cinch is tied or buckled. They exhale air after the cinch is fastened and therby cause the saddle to be loosened. Some cow ponies, probably because of the manner in which they are first broken and handled, develop the habit "bucking". of This habit marks some horses as unsuitable for riding; others seem gentle, but they may "break in two" and throw their riders when least expected.

vices (bad habits) of Most horses are difficult to correct once they are developed. the habit is much Preventing more desirable than trying to correct it. Older horses, however, can be broken of many undesirable habits and taught new tricks. It should be remembered that horses are not "pals", generally considered as is often the relationship of dogs to man. Rather. horses must be taught to serve and respect their masters.

DETERMINING THE AGE OF HORSES

mature male horse has 40 A teeth, whereas a mature female has only 36. Foals of both sexes have 24. Frequently, a small pointed tooth, sometimes "wolf tooth" called a mav appear in front of each first molar in the upper jaw, thus increasing tooth numbers by two. The mature male (usually not the female) commonly has or pointed teeth, tushes, located between the incissors and molars. The appearance of teeth is used to determine a horse's age, which is important when purchasing horses. Age is determined by noting the time of appearance, the and the degree of wear shape, of temporary and permanent teeth. Temporary (milk) teeth are easily distinguished from permanent teeth because they smaller and whiter. are Even the novice can recognize a "smooth-mouthed" horse (normally considered a horse 10 or more years old). A description of the teeth of horses at various ages is given in Figure 20.7.



HORSE SCENTS CONTINUED FROM J & J STABLES

This is a 6 part article, taken from the book <u>The Body</u> <u>Language of Horses</u>. I suggest any horse owner or would be horse owner read this book.

HEARING

The loudspeakers of a typical high-fidelity sound system produce musical tones ranging from a low of 20 cycles to a high of 20,000. Anything lower or higher is needless inaudible luxury, to most human beings. The auditory faculties of horses are greatly superior. They hear a much broader spectrum. Moreover, their hearing is many times more acute. They detect approaching footsteps, wheels, whistles, voices and storms Indeed, long before we can. they hear at such stupendous distances that some of us credit them with supernatural powers far beyond the auditory.

The entire body of the horse is a sound receiver. It processes airborne sound through the ears and earthborne sound through an amplifying system which goes from the feet to the inner ear and brain by way of bones, nerves and bodily cavities.

This receiver is always at work. A horse dozes, head down, ears drooping to the sides. A quarter of a mile from the paddock fence, a neighbor's mule crosses the The horse's ears spring road. It raises its to attention. head and directs nose, eves and ears at the moving animal. Two seconds later, satisfied that all is well, the horse resumes its nap.

A horse's ears swivel on their vertical axes, somewhat like rotary antennas. Most breeds can turn the ears conthat 180 siderably farther although none can degrees, turn the right ear fully left or the left fully right. This swiveling action facilitates long concave reception. The openings, assisted in many cases by the swinging head, turn directly toward an arresting sound, whether at the either side or to front, directly behind the animal. When the sound provokes apprehensiveness, the horse may swing not only its head but its entire body in in the direction already taken by the The ears then assume ears. the forward, pricked position of total interest, all senses working in concert.

The horse's hearing and its interpretations of what it hears are so indispensable to its sense of security that any impairment of this sense causes deep distress. When aural passages are congested by an infection such as a cold. the animal suffers more severly from its anxiety than the infection itself. from For similar reasons, horses stabled near busy airports, terminals or other rail sources of overwhelming noise are seldom as composed and therefore seldom as healthy as It may be they might be. argued that they have imprespowers of adaptation sive help them to become which uproar. accustomed to such But horses retain the need to themselves to their attune environment by keeping track of its sounds and investigating the abnormal ones. finally stop reacting to the din with overt anguish, they do not sleep as peacefully or eat as heartily as they should.

Just as disturbed hearing affects equine composure, so does disturbed composure affect hearing. As we shall

show, the motions of the ears and the positions in which they come to rest are basic elements of the animal's body profoundly language. When angered, frightened or pained, the horse becomes abnormally indifferent to sound. The positions of its ears reveal with considerable this eloquence. Moreover, in combination with other elements of body language, the ears state the nature of the horse's trouble almost 25 explicitly as speech could.

There can be no doubt that ability of riderless the horses to go straight home in the dark is at least partly a their function of acute The same is true of hearing. their unerring "forecasts" of electrical storms, high winds They become and earthquakes. restless long before any human being is aware of a change in the weather or vibrations underfoot. And a blind horse uses its hearing and memory to navigate safely within the fences of its paddock or even, as often told, at the front end of a delivery wagon.

It is a great temptation to ascribe equine homing ability, weather forecasts and similar phenomena to some extra sense. In his book . Breeding the Frederico Tesio, Racehorse, one of the most successful breeders who ever lived. speculated about a sense that might enable horses to receive electrical or other radiations from inanimate objects at long distances. He believed that

the ears were involved but not in the usual way. Until the faculties of horses are tested more scientifically than they have been thus far, the theory of a sixth sense remains moot. But there can be no doubt of the horse's almost incredibly acute hearing.


