

RODEO EVENTS

SADDLE BRONC RIDING

Saddle bronc riding matches a specially bred bucking horse and a delicately balanced rider who must stay aboard for 8 seconds to make a qualified The rider uses approved saddle with stirrups and a 6-foot braided rein which he holds with one hand only. Saddle bronc riders are disqualified if they touch themselves, the horse or their equipment with their free hand.

This rough stock event is more a contest of balance and style than one of brute strength. The rhythm established in time with the horse's bucking pattern requires close coordination between lifting on the rein and spurring with dull, rounded spurs.

Two riding judges combine scores to mark each horse up to 50 points for their bucking ability, and each rider up to 50 points for their riding skill and style. With up to 100 total points available, saddle bronc riders bear down on every ride trying to maximize their score.

THAT'S IMPORTANT! Please take the time to read the Lariat and the October attend membership meeting.

It has been said that there are three types of people on this planet: Those who make things happen, those who watch things happen, and those who say "what happened?" Right now I feel like one of those who says "what happened?" Not only that, I have great feelings of guilt for not providing the membership with more details on some of the critical votes that were taken during the September General Membership Meeting. The one that really bothers me is the elimination of satellite clubs. Let me clarify a few points:

-Contrary to what was said at the membership meeting, a majority of the "Texarkana" members do want to be a satellite/chapter club. If they cannot be one, they want their membership fees returned; and they will seek satellite status with some other association.

-It would not be confusing to have satellites/chapters in the DSRA. Texas has had them for years. Are we assuming that as Arkansans we are not as perceptive or intelligent as our brothers and sisters from Texas, or that we could not discern between a "state" officer and a "satellite/chapter" officer of DSRA?


-I am surprised by the statement, "we are a small association". We are the third largest association in the IGRA. Yes, Texas and California have more members; but if we are small compared to them, then we are GIANTS compared to the other ten associations. For example, the DSRA had more members working during Mid Summer other Madness than most associations have members. had more people vote in our election than there are members of most other associations (and only a third of our membership voted). Want more? If the Little Rock "area" was satellite/ chapter, we would be as large or larger than any chapter in Texas!

-Our accountant, (whom we pay \$50.00 an hour), recommended that for our best interests, the 501(C)3 status, and for dealing with state and federal laws, we should have satellites/chapters. (continued on page 5)

SUNDAY NIGHT DANCES





Dignity's ministry encompasses:


-The spiritual development and growth of members through celebrating the Mass and encouragement of personal prayer.

The headstall is made of leather and fits over the horse's head. It has a crown, which goes behind the ears; a browband, which rests on the forehead; two cheekpieces, which catch the top rings of the bit; a throatlatch, a noseband, and a curbstrap, which sits behind the lower lip and holds the bit in place.

The bit is the metal part of the bridal which is inserted into the horse's mouth. The bar, or mouthpiece, rests on the tongue; the two side pieces, support the bar and line up at the corners of the mouth. The curb chain holds the piece in place and provides pressure on the jaws when the reins are pulled.


The reins, which guide or stop your mount, are usually made of leather and are open or closed, the closed rein makes a complete loop from one side of the bit to the other; while the open reins are cut in the center of the loop so that either side will touch the ground. It is interesting to note that when the open reins are dropped, the horse considers himself "tied". He will not move, since moving means he will step on his reins and trip.

In the old days many western bridles were homemade; there were a great many variations in style, and in the types of materials used. The rigging of the bridle could be very simple or it could a full complement of equipment ready for show.

LETTER FROM THE EDITOR

The next general membership meeting will be host once again to the discussion of whether or not DSRA should have independent chapters. This month's Letter From The President strongly advocates this proposal, and many members feel that this would be a good idea. membership voted this issue down at the last meeting, but some feel this was not a well informed decision. It important that we know all the facts - once and for all; that we make a decision and go on with the other business of the association.

In addition to the viewpoints expressed in the President's Letter, there is the matter of the new system of government this gives to DSRA. At this point, we would have three elected sets of officers if we have chapters. The Texarkana group, the Little Rock group, then the state group. means three sets of records, three checkbooks, and three separate groups of leaders. It is hard to see "new" members holding these positions for the Little Rock chapter, especially since the current Board of Directors ran for their positions unopposed. Most likely, these duties would be filled by the some of the 30 members that remain consistently active in DSRA. Is this giving DSRA too many Chiefs and not enough Indians?

Texas is a great place to look at how satellite chapters are run - and supported. Aside from their enormous population, Texas has some of the finest experienced rodeo participants in the country. These are the

people that make up these chapters. We, in comparison, have had less than 10 people compete in rodeos. The number of members that participated in an event that involved a horse is less than half of that. My point is: is it realistic to be going to independent chapters when it appears we could work better together as a group - working to someday be able to be as strong and competive as states like Texas?

DSRA is a charitable as well as a "western" organization. looking at our dollar figures for what we have given to charitable organizations this year, it does not add up to any amount to be proud of. There always seem to be more pressing matters to be concerned with, both financially and officially. It appears that the matter concerning chapters has already taken up a great deal of time over the past several months, and would most likely require additional time to get things ironed out in the beginning. Is this time well spent? There is no question that we are proud to have the Texarakana people as a part of DSRA. The question is do we have to have them as a chapter in order for it to be a benefit for all of the DSRA? Growth is good, but productive growth is what is important.

There are valid and good reasons why DSRA should have chapters. There are many facts that need to be considered on the other side of this issue as well. It is my concern that this decision be made in a fair and objective manner, and that if we are to have chapters, we have them for the right reasons.

National Round-Up

- * The city of Louisville, Kentucky, recently enacted a comprehensive hate crimes ordinance. The ordinance increases penalties for crimes motivated by an individual's sexual orientation or health-related condition, as well as other characteristics. Also, the Governor of New Jersey recently signed a law that increases the penalties for crimes motivated by a bias against a person's religion, race, ethnicity or sexual orientation. (Reported in The Washington Blade, August 3 and August 24, 1990).
- * In August the U. S. Congress approved legislation that would provide more that \$4 billion over five years for AIDS services. The legislation targets funds for 16 cities that have been the hardest hit by the disease and has provisions for grants to all states for the purpose of improving the quality and availability of AIDS care services. (Reported in The Advocate, September 11, 1990)
- * The Washington Blade (August 24, 1990) reported that Ithaca, New York, became the first city on the East Coast to provide a procedure for citizens to publicly register as domestic partners. The ordinance applies to both homosexual and heterosexual unmarried partners who are at least 18 years old and who are each other's sole domestic partner; share a primary residence and intend to do so for the indefinite future; and who are in a relationship "of mutual support, caring, and commitment and are responsible for each other's welfare".
- * The Des Moines, Iowa, school board has adopted a policy that prohibits discrimination against gay teachers, students and staff members. (Reported in <u>The Advocate</u>, September 11, 1990)
