NGRA Mourns the Passing of Two Members of the 2012 Royalty Team



It is with great sadness that NGRA announces the recent passing of two members of our 2012 Royalty Team: Miss NGRA 2012 and Miss IGRA 2013, Sabel D'Zyre, and Mr NGRA 1st Runner-Up and Mr IGRA 2013 2nd Runner-Up, Curtiss Lewis.

Joel Castillo (aka Sabel D'Zyre)

Joel passed away on Saturday, July 26. He was born in Mexico City, Mexico on July 4, 1971. He lived in Las Vegas since 1973, although in 1996 he ran off to "join the circus" and his boy persona played a 7-year stint in Orlando, Florida working and performing for Walt Disney World, Universal Studios Orlando, Busch Gardens Tampa Bay, and Nickelodeon Recreation. Joel returned to Las Vegas in 2004 and joined NGRA back in 2008 after experiencing his first rodeo as a timer for BigHorn Rodeo. He volunteered at several rodeos across the IGRA circuit and served as Assistant Rodeo Director for BigHorn 14 & 15. Joel also had the privilege of representing NGRA as part of their 20th Anniversary Team as Miss NGRA 2012. Sabel's "drag career" began back in 1993, when she won the title of Miss Vegas Gay Pride for Las Vegas' first Pride Pageant competition.



Joel had a soul that was funny, irreverent, welcoming and a generous individual who turned up to all the fundraisers, never failing to support whenever called upon.

Joel was instrumental in raising a large amount of money for the Las Vegas and International Community and had a lot of fun doing it. Joel showed everyone what fun was in "fundraising" and continued that tradition with his terms as Miss NGRA 2012 and continuing on as Miss IGRA 2013. Joel will be missed by all and remembered by many throughout this community and nationwide.

Not only was he a wonderful and giving individual, but also he was a great friend to all. He will always be remembered as a great man and loving friend. We are lucky to have someone such as Joel watching over us all. There is now one more star in the heavens shining down on us.

Condolences go out to his family and dear friends, he will be dearly missed.

Joel's Memorial Service will be held on Tuesday, August 5th from 4-6 pm at Palm Mortuary located at 1325 North Main Street, Las Vegas, Nevada.

Joel Castillo will be cremated.

Curtiss Lewis, Jr. (aka Mocha Grande)

Curtiss passed away unexpectedly Friday, July 18, 2014. He was born June 15, 1970 in Austin, Texas. He will be buried next to his mother in Kinder, Louisiana on August 23, 2014.



Curtiss was a valued member and leader in the Desert Empire during Reigns 1 through 3 as Grand Duchess in Reign 1, Marquesa in Reign 2 and finally Crown Princess Royale in Reign 3. He had a sweet and gentle soul and loved to make people laugh. He was one of the original members of the Cheerleaders of Heffer U, who dazzled crowds doing his mid-air splits at rodeos starting in 1998. Curtiss also joined the Church Ladies of Tupelo Mississippi after DeShannon moved.

Curtiss continued his tradition of hard work with his terms as Mr. NGRA 1st Runner-Up 2012 and continuing on as Mr. IGRA 2nd Runner-Up 2013.

Condolences go out to his family and dear friends, he will be dearly missed.

Curtiss' viewing will take place Friday, August 15th from 4pm-8pm and again on Saturday, August 16 from 11am-2pm at Ebenezer Church of God in Christ, 1072 W Bartlett Avenue, Las Vegas, NV 89106.



- Doug Graff as an Announcer






Curtiss epitomized the heart and soul of NGRA & IGRA.

Death Valley and Aguereberry Point

I wonder what thoughts are conjured in the mind by the mention of Death Valley.




I imagine one thinks of an environment where life is barely sustainable, barren open space, perhaps with the occasional skull or some bones of a creature that did not survive the extreme conditions. There are extremes indeed, with daytime highs in the summer reaching well above 100°F and night time lows in the winter falling below freezing point. Just out of curiosity, I checked on The Weather Channel to find that the highest recorded temperature was 134°F on July 10, 1913, at Furnace Creek, which is the hottest atmospheric temperature ever recorded on earth; the lowest was 15°F in the same year. Annual rainfall is a mere 2.4 inches. It's quite astonishing that anything survives, yet there are wild flowers and small trees, and small creatures, mostly bugs and reptiles, eeking out a living.

Carolyn and I were in Death Valley, California at the end of August 2010, and we stopped at Stovepipe Wells Village for a few days. The daytime temperatures reached about 113°F. One evening, as the temperature cooled to a mere 104°F, we decided to drive to Aguereberry Point for sunset. We had been there a few year's before but it's good to repeat enjoyable experiences.

As usual, when touring the United States, we hired a Sports Utility Vehicle (SUV) so as to be prepared to take advantage of off-road opportunities. Couple this with Sat-Nav on board, Microsoft Streets and Trips with GPS on the laptop, and Google Maps on-line and we can find our way pretty well anywhere.

We picked up a copy of the Death Valley Visitor Guide from the Ranger Station just across the road from our room at the Stovepipe Wells Village and glanced at the map in the centrefold. Interestingly, it showed the last 6.4 miles of the drive to Aguereberry Point as a mixture of "unpaved road" and "high clearance recommended". Whilst I would always bow to the advice given in National Park Service publications and by the rangers, in this instance the route can be negotiated by pretty well any vehicle with care. Ok, if you only have a modest car, you will need to be a bit more careful and drive more slowly. Get yourself something a bit more rugged and you can have some real fun.

So let's get down to the trip. Starting from Stovepipe Wells Village, head West on CA190 for 10 miles. Make a left turn onto Wildrose Road.




Don't get confused that the Death Valley Visitor Guide calls it Emigrant Canyon Road. Stay travelling South on Wildrose Road (or whatever) and when you pass a turn for Skidoo on the left you don't have long to wait for the fun to start.

After 11.8 miles on Wildrose Road, make a left onto Aguereberry Point [Road | Track].



Now you tell yourself what a good idea it was to rent an SUV. You are on what they call "unpaved road". It looks as though they just ran a bulldozer across the desert and forgot to send along the tarmac-laying machine afterwards.





Notice how thoughtful are the Americans in providing a turnout for you to extricate yourself if you decide off-roading is not for you after all.

This is a good point to discuss a few points about driving technique. Choose an upright yet relaxed driving position; raise your seat to improve your view particularly just in front of the vehicle. Note how the emphasis is different from highway driving when you need good observation over all distances and all around.

Drive with the "Thumbs Out" and with a slightly loosened grip, thereby reducing the risk of broken thumbs should the steering wheel suddenly kick as the vehicle encounters a rock or hole. My apologies for this picture's being of my Discovery back home. I only decided, late on, to include this piece in the article.



Whilst you do need to pick your course carefully, and avoid obvious obstacles, you need to "go with the flow" and not force the precise course. Be careful with rocks and other debris. The natural reaction is to steer to miss them with the wheels but, if you do, be careful the object doesn't hit the differential (usually the lowest point). It's worth checking your ground clearance beforehand.

So off we drove into the sunset. Doesn't it sound romantic? One couldn't help thinking that it was fortunate no-one was following. We were conscious that we were generating a localised dust storm. So I tried pulling up and grabbing the camera to try and capture the cloud I had whipped up. The dust did seem to settle fairly quickly and there as a light breeze helping to disperse it. So we tried a different approach. Carolyn stood by the track and I backed up a couple of hundred metres before hitting the gas. By the time I was alongside, I was doing about 45 mph and making a convincing cloud.




If you look at the bottom right-hand of the picture you will see ripples. Driving over these was quite exhilarating. We pressed on and promised to stop on the way back.

Presently, we started a more pronounced climb and we could see the Summit. If you look towards the left side of the next picture, you can see a flattened portion. That's where the track goes.




As we neared this point my co-driver said something to the effect of "Never mind the Thumbs Rule. Stick your thumbs where you like. Just make sure you hold the wheel tight. There's oblivion a couple of feet over there!"



In case you were thinking, this isn't a ghost car. There is no-one inside. I just had to go back and stage this picture so you could get a better impression.

The track continues to curve to the right and, lo and behold, you're at the top and looking over Death Valley. From the SUV's Sat-Nav, the location of Aguereberry Point is 36°21'29"N, 117°02'52"W. These coordinates check out with Google Maps and Microsoft Streets and Trips. So, don't I trust Sat-Nav? Only after I've satisfied myself by a broad cross-check with another navigational method [or two]. Bottom line, there's nothing like a good map.

From the sign, the elevation is 6433 ft and due to the altitude, the temperature has fallen to 68°F.



Walk to the edge and this is the view to the South-East over Death Valley. The light coloured area beyond the crags on the left is the Badwater Basin, some 15 miles away and over 6,700 ft below. This is the lowest elevation in the United States at 282 ft (86 m) below sea level. The Badwater Salt Flats are 5 miles across and take their colour from the deposits of white salt.



As the sun began to set, it shone on the back of the SUV making it seem to glow as the reddening sun mingled with all the sand we had collected on the way up. Perhaps I'm just soft but I think it looks pretty.



We waited while the sun sank further below the horizon. The earlier light breeze had dropped and nothing stirred. Not a soul was in sight. No words can describe the solitude. It is absolutely quiet. Just sit on a rock and enjoy it. As you try to listen for anything, all you can hear is a kind of white noise. I guess your ears are telling you "no signal".




Remember to use the gearbox or transmission to give improved control and to prevent brake fade on steep descents. The way back from Aguereberry Point offers an opportunity to practice this skill. Remember the ripples? The best way I can liken the experience is to say it felt as though you were driving over a cattle grid except that it went on for hundreds of metres at a time.



We stopped for a picture with light from the SUV. The ripples had a fairly regular pitch of about 450mm (actually about one and a half boot's worth) and a depth of a few 10s of millimetres. If you travelled at about 5 mph, it was perfectly smooth but, above that, the regular "drumming" set in. It didn't really get much worse if you speeded up so we pressed on. We returned to Stovepipe Wells, sea level and 104°F.

Finally, I hope I've given some of you a taste for driving off-road. Something like this trip is fairly safe, and a good way to start.
